### Macon Count, League of Women Voters

The discussion groups for January will meet on Tuesday, January 11, at one o'clock at the Decatur Club (Luncheon meeting); and on Thursday, January 13, at seven-thirty in the Library. Note the change of time and place of this last meeting: 7:30, Library.

The subject of these meetings will be Should the United States join collective defensive pacts?" Some of the points to be discussed will be:

- 1. The main U.N. Charter provisions for an U.N. collective security s, stem and reasons why this system has not been established to date.
  - 2. The Rio de Janeiro pact.
  - 3. The Brussels pact.
  - General vs. regional pacts.
  - 5. The Vandenberg resolution.

Mrs. C. E. Smith's committee will lead these meetings. Mrs. Smith will be assisted by Mrs. Cohen at the luncheon meeting and by Mrs. Sterns and Miss Perry at the evening meeting. In view of the urgency of this question, we hope every member will be present at one of these meetings. To quote from a letter received from Miss Strauss, President of the League,

"The issue is expected to come before Congress early in January. Your Board will need to point out the importance of this question to our members and plan for them to discuss the BRIEF and form their opinions during the next few weeks. I urge you to write the National headquarters of opinion in your League as it develops..." In accordance with Miss Strauss's request, the committee will ask for the opinion of the group at the end of each meeting.

The general meeting for Anuary will be on January 27, at seven-thirty.

Subject: the present status of the Constitutional Convention.

The fight for a new state constitution (our state project) will be renewed with the 1949 General Assembly. If the General Assembly agrees to another trial for a new constitution, it will mean a referendum in the general election of 1950. At it passes then by a majority of all voting, the General Assembly of 1951 will set a date for an election of delegates to a Constitutional Convention. It's a long process, even if there's success at every turn.

There is to be a meeting in Chicago, January 13 and 14, to plan the part the League will take in this fight for a new constitution. Ars. Kuhns is attending this planning meeting. Ars. Charles Ruedi has agreed to help our local League with the above program.

Mrs. Kunns had an interesting interview with hepresentative Ferguson to

see how the League could help.

Discussion groups for February will meet on February 8 and 10, at the usual times and places. Mrs. E. C. McConnell and Mrs. W. W. McLaughlin will discuss the budget, based on the Memo, "The Forty Billion Dollar Question".

On November 4 and 5, there was an Economic Conference of the Chicago area. Mrs. McConnell and Mrs. McLa ghlin attended, as representatives of the Decatur League. What they learned there, they will try to bring to Decatur's membership as fully as possible. It would be well for all members who are interested to become familiar with the Memo mentioned above—"The Forty Billion Dollar Question". Myou do not have time to read it, it would pay you at least to glance through it and study the charts a bit. They are most revealing.

The big reason for studying the Federal Tax and Fiscal Policy is that it seems to be essential that we women understand it if we keep urging better

schools, etc. After all, if we insist on the spending of more and more money

we should know something of how this money is to be raised.

In February we hope to have a good speaker from outside our organization who can enlighten us as to what we must know about our Federal and Fiscal Policy if we are to be intelligent voters.

#### The School Bond Issue

The Education Committee, headed by Mrs. Simmons, offered the following recommendation, which the Board unanimously approved:

"Since our project this year has been education, we recommend that:

1. We will either assume leadership in urging the school bond issue, or cooperate to the utmost with any other group that leads.

2. The board make a public statement of our endorsement of the school

bond issue."

The School bond issue is expected to come up in March or April. League Lembers will consult Mr. McIntosh about suitable action.

### The Un ted Nations Committee

On October 12, at the luncheon meeting of the League, the U.N. Committee gave a report on the work done by the Workshop Group. Three members took part:
Mrs. Martin Cohen reported on the Charter, with special reference to the "Veto"
and other articles currently in the news; Mrs. Elwin Clark reported on the
many worthwhile things the Urited Nations had accomplished; and Mrs. David wood reported on the various methods which might be used to strengthen the U.N. A general discussion was held by all members present, after the reports were given.

On October 14, at the evening meeting, the same procedure was followed with Miss Grace Bridges reporting on the Charter, Mrs. Clifford Smith on the accomplishments, and Mrs. Wood on the possible ways of strengthening the organi-

On Sunday, November 7, an article written by members of the Workshop was published in the <u>Herald and Review</u>. This was a summary of the findings in the Workshop study meetings. We hope it accomplished the goal set by the <u>National</u> League: that of reaching the greatest possible number of people in our community and helping them to know and understand their United Nations a little better.

On January 21, we are to present programs to the Parent Teachers Associations of mnie School at 3 P.M. and of Pugh Street School at 7:30 P.M.

The Government in Operation Committee reports the eleven Voters' Handbooks were presented to the Senior High School, St. Theresa and the four Junior High Schools of Decatur by the League of Women Voters of Macon County.

The Action Committee: All calls for action were answered. Only in the case of protesting the possible cut in E.C.A. funds did we think that the consensus of opinion was strong enough to justify sending telegrams to our congressmen.

In the case of Reciprocal Trade Treaties, Federal Aid to Education and Home Rule, the Board decided that we could not support the issue as a unit, but those most interested were urged to write individually -- supporting their convictions.


No publicity was necessary since these issues already had strong press support here.

State Finance Meeting:

On Friday, February 16, Mrs. Etheridge, Mrs. Chumbley and Mrs. Birt will go to Chicage to hear Mrs. Malcolm Cummings, National Finance Chairman.

Proposed State Current Agenda:

l. Provision for a flexible state fiscal structure, particularly for the essential programs of education, welfare, health, and highways.

This would entail a further study of state expenditure, taxation and sources of revenue. It might envision action on a constitutional amendment to give the legislature more general powers in tax matters. The League should aim to decide what are essential programs in the four fields as opposed to the desirable.

2. Provision for functional and administrative reorganization of stagovernment, particularly for the essential programs of education, welfare, health and highways.

This is directed toward League support of recommendations of the Schaefer Commission. However it could also authorize action in support of constitutional amendments for annual session of the legislature, the short ballot, reapportionment, reform of the judiciary, and home rule for municipalities.

Proposed Agenda, continued:

Protection of civil liberties, including the enactment of a Fair Employment Practices Act.

We would continue to work for such constitutional rights as academic freedom of press, speech and assembly; the proper treatment of accused persons including due process of law; and the equal rights of all citizens, regardless of race, creed or color. The term "civil rights" has generally come to designate more narrowly the rights of minority groups. The broader field of constitutional rights of all citizens is now usually called "civil liberties." The right of employment on mer only without regard for race, creed or color has been declared a civi right by the United Nations in its Universal Declaration of Human Righ and by the states of New York, Connecticut, etc. In Illinois, it remains one of the rights retained by the people not yet specifically defined as a civil right in law.

Proposed Additions to the Continuing Responsibilities: A Constitutional Convention.

Strengthening the motor drivers' license law. (The League supported the original law under which we now operate.)

The reports of the various committees followed:

Mrs. Kuhns, as publicity chairman, showed an unbelievably large number of newspaper clippings accumulated through the year. The Decatur papers have published stories we supplied but have also printed a number of items on their own. We are grateful to our good Pressfew Leagues are so fortunate.

Mrs. DeVore, for Voter's Service, reported on the efforts at the two largest launderettes to inform people of the need for the Gateway Amendment. Members talked to 223 people; we also had a radio program on Gateway. On February 14, we held our fifth candidates' meeting where about 575 people heard 24 candidates.

Mrs. Smith, program chairman, reviewed the materials presented at meetings this year. In our study groups, we have discussed the branches of our state government and the areas of greatest spending in the state; on the national agenda, we heard Dr. Stine on the U.N., and reviews of Chicago addresses on the UN and Asiatic problems and inflationary trends.

Mrs. Cox told of our local project -- the distribution of 6,000 grocery sacks on which were printed a few facts before the tax referendum.

Mrs. Donován, economics chairman, spoke on the League's support for a pay-as-wego fiscal policy for the federal govern-ment, both as a basis for sound financing and as a means of curbing inflation. We sent Senator Douglas a telegram indicating our support of increased taxes and credit restrictions.

A report, prepared by Mrs. Wood, on the Reciprocal Trade Agreements, urged members to write their Senators to support these agreements without the crippling amendments added in the House.

Mrs. Nelson told of the two days in Springfield where several of us watched the senate and house in session and sat in on committee hearings.

Mrs. Cox, our legislative chairman, reported on present legislation pending and reviewed on a recent hearing on the Broyles bills.

She reports that the All Tomen's Congress is hard at work and that women from the villages are Congress is hard at work and that women from the villages are beginning to join their city sisters in taking a far more active part in the progress of affairs. Philippines: Mrs. Balboa reports that the Press gave very generous space to the Voters' Information Service patterned on the LWV in the recent election campaign. From the West: Germany: Mrs. Dyke brought messages from all the German women, sponsored by the CCCMF more than 2 years ago. She was immensely impressed with the spirit the hard work, and the progress all of them are making in their various fields. Florence Harrison, of the Women's Service Bureau, visited Germany this summer and met nearly 100 women who had been in the US, each of whom is demonstrating the value of the exchange program. We wish space let us quote her whole onderful report. They discussed the grim realities of the refugee and unemployment problems that underlie all others and affect all decisions of Parliament. Nora Melle, she says is a force on our side in the cold war through the Staatsburgerinnen-Verband in Berlin. Anna Haag is doing great work and Julie von Campenhausen is active in the trade union group. Italy: Dr. Scelba says, "There is a general conclusion to be drawn from observation of American community activitles and organizations at work; the public and social spiritedness of the people and groups, the cooperation among individuals and government, and private agencies." It is this cooperation which every visitor from every other land always stresses. Sardinia: September 24 saw the start of the program of teacher training for Sardinia, with 50 enrolled. The Union to Combat Illiteracy organized it; we financed it, \$3000.00 worth.

It was decided at your local Board meeting on March 6th to shorten, as much as possible, the business of the Annual Meeting. We therefore voted to mimeograph the minutes of the last Annual Meeting for distribution rather than having them read.

SUMMARY OF THE PAST YEAR'S WORK - - - Local level:

City-Manager form of government by Mrs. Robert Wood The City-Manager Resource Committee has devoted itself so far to an examination of the recent State Legislation permitting the establishment of the city-manager form of government and to a study of city finances. Believing that we could better relate the advantages and disadvantages of the city-manager to our present Commission form of government, we began a detailed study of the sources of revenue for the city. We shall follow this study with an examination of city expenditures and department operations at all times correlating such studies to the material relating to city-manager.

State level:

Basic Constitution Revision

The need for basic revision of the Illinois Constitution has been studied by a Resource Committee of 12 League members. The Revenue Article received particular attention as an amendment to it is being offered to the voters of Illinois this fall. Although the amendment has drawbacks, the League will devote Voters' Service work to its passage in the November elections. The committee also examined the problems of the Reorganization of the Court System, Re-apportionment and Home Rule: areas in which basic revision of the 1870 Constitution are needed to bring it up to date. The League has studied these last in order that we may be prepared to offer suggestions as to the structure of the amendments should the Legislature consider them.

Civil Liberties

The Civil Liberties Committee has met in several sessions since January. We have studied the Memo "Individual Liberty USA", the Federal Constitution, the Illinois State Constitution and amendments dealing with Civil Liberties. We have sought knowledge on some of the Supreme Court decisions concerning prominent civil liberties cases. An excellent reference book has been "The Loyalty of Free Men" by Alan Barth. Also very valuable has been the study of reprints of speeches made before state meetings: "Civil Liberty and Democratic

Loyalty" by Prof. Donald Meiklejohn and "Some Modern Problems of Civil Liberties" by Prof. Francis A. Allen.

From the Progress Report of the Carrie Chapman Catt Memorial Fund, Inc., a Research and Educational Fund created by the League of Women Voters of the U.S. Metropolitan Area Project Under Way: It is generally agreed that widespread and continuous participation of citizens in government is essential in a democracy, and that it is desirable in the U.S. to increase not only the percentage of persons who vote but also those who take some responsibility for government the year around. Groups working to bring this about have not shown widespread results, particularly in the large metropolitan areas where it is especially hard for people to feel in close touch with their government. It seems important to find out why this is true and what fresh approaches and new methods might be used by voluntary civic agencies to obtain better results. The CCCMF is undertaking such a study in a metropolitan area. Philadelphia has been selected as a typical large city in which to work. The project will seek the answers to five vital questions: 1. What are the obstacles to better citizen participation in government? 2. Why have we failed to overcome them?

3. What avenues are being used to overcome them, and how successfully?

4. What existing facilities are not fully utilized?

5. How can they be better utilized? be better utilized?

An explanation may be in order for new members concerning the letters you will receive very soon from the Finance Committee. Just to remind you, if you come across someone who is not registered --YOU must REGISTER in order to VOTE

YOU must be 21 years of age by election day

YOU must have permanent residence in the precinct 30 days, county 90 days and the state 1 year

YOU must appear in person to register at the Registration Office on the 4th floor of the County Bldg.

OR YOU may register in person at the place and time designated recently by the County Clerk for your precinct.
YOU must REGISTER before OCT. 6th, if you wish to VOTE NOV. 4th.

Once registered, you need not register again unless —
YOU failed to vote in elections held during the last 4 years
YOU moved into the jurisdiction of another election authority (in this
case, outside of Macon County)
YOU changed your name, either by marriage or legal procedure

If you have moved to another residence within the county before Oct. 6th, you must mail the Registration Office a notice of your change of address, personally signed, otherwise you lose your right to vote.

If you move from one precinct to another, between Oct. 6th and Nov. 4th, you lose your right to vote Nov. 4th.

If you move from one residence to another within the same precinct, during the Oct. 6th to Nov. 4th period, you may vote on Nov. 4th by securing and signing the necessary affidavits.

Revenue Amendment to Article IX of the Illinois State Constitution:
You will recall that HJR 40 was passed by the last session of the State
Legislature. In accordance with the law, the amendment will be placed on the
ballot, Nov. 4th, and it must have approval of 2/3rd's of the people voting
on the amendment before its passage is assured. If it fails, it will be
impossible to place a similar amendment before the voters before 1956.

This amendment has the support of both political parties, it has the support of the Chicago Ass'n of Commerce and Industry, the CIO, the Parent-Teachers Organization of Illinois, the Illinois Agricultural Ass'n and many other organizations as well as the League of Women Voters of Illinois. In studying the opposition to passage of this amendment, we find that opposition is definitely not on party lines and not on economic lines,— instead we find opposition based upon a lack of knowledge of our tax structure and of what the amendment will accomplish.

WE MUST OVERCOME THIS BARRIER OF LACK OF KNOWLEDGE. WE DID IT ON GATEWAY AND IT CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED ON REVENUE ALSO.

The League of Women Voters of Decatur has been the spearhead for the organization of the Joint Committee for the Revenue Amendment of Macon County.
