SUMMARY OF THE YEAR'S WORK

LOCAL LEVEL:

<u>Voter's Service</u> - Because we were not as active in Political Action in the community as in previous years, we undertook several new projects, in order to help orient new members and familiarize old members with the true meaning of Voter's Service.

Questionnaire - Questionnaire was sent to all city candidates. Questions and answers were published in the newspaper Sunday before the April 1, 1955 City Election.

Orientation Meeting - At the Orientation Meeting for new members, I used a number of posters to illustrate some of the ways Voter's Service can be accomplished in Decatur. The posters depicted the Candidate's Meeting, Registration, building Public Opinion, correct voting procedures, etc. Miss Muriel Perry from the Public Library was present at the meeting. She suggested that we have a display of the posters at the Public Library. This was done before our Finance Drive to keep the public informed of League activities. Voter's Service had not been a part of our Orientation of new members heretofore. I would recommend that this always be a part of the orientation of new members because many of them are interested in this part of League Work.

<u>Larkdale Annexation</u> - Because the Larkdale Annexation was subject to a Referendum, October 4, the League Board voted to do a Voter's Service so that they might vote intelligently. There was a full page spread in the newspaper the Sunday before the annexation referendum with questions from the League and answers from the objectors, Mr. Lubin and

the City Council members.

Voters Service Workshop - This is the first time that a Voters Service Workshop has been held in the Decatur League. We are studying The Election Code of Illinois, The Illinois Voter's Handbook, Political Parties, Their Organization and Influence, Choosing the President of the U.S.A. The Workshop has been a busy and interesting one. We are planning to present part of the material to the membership at the February 15th Unit Meeting. I would strongly recommend that this workshop be a part of League study each year. It is of particular benefit to new members and many older members of the League have attended.

<u>Candidate's Meeting</u> - Our Candidate's Meeting will be held March 8 at the Decatur High School Auditorium. This is before the Primary April 10th. The napkins advertising the meeting are to be used again. The newspapers are giving their usual fine support to Mrs. Clifford Smith, Chairman and Mrs. James Hurley, Public Relations Chairman. Fortythree candidates were asked, thirty-four accepted, Mr. Robert Shade is to be the moderator, and the timers will be two students from Millikin University.

Station WSOY alloted us a fifteen minute program, which was covered by Mrs. Floyd

Birt, Mrs. Ernie Cresswell, discussing the candidates meeting.

A panel of four members, Mrs. William Gardner, Mrs. Forest Martin, Mrs. Perley Lupton and Mrs. William Hipsher gave a thirty minute skit on League background and the candidates in general.

Mrs. Clifford Smith, general chairman of the candidates committee, was interviewed on WTVP television, March 5th.

The League's public relations within our community is very good. The daily newspapers and the weekly Advertiser have all been generous in giving us various types of publicity and space in the news whenever we ask for it.

League members have been attending Council meetings for the past year, and the feeling prevails that we are now accepted as practically being a part of the "council" family"...in fact, we've been told, the Mayor is inclined to look around with a worried

frown IF the League member is not in her seat at roll-call.

The League is represented on many and varied civic groups in Decatur. On the Association of Commerce committees we have a member serving in the following capacities: Legislative Committee, Mrs. H. W. Gibson; Public Health, Mrs. Ayrlie Morris; Education, Mrs. Wm. Winn; Taxation, Mrs. Thomas McCracken; Decatur Neighborhood, Mrs. Charles Griffin: Mrs. Forest Martin and Mrs. Ralston Goss are serving on the Council of Social Agencies; Mrs. Clifford E. Smith on the Decatur Adult Education Advisory Committee; Mrs. Wm. Gardner on the Temporary committee on United Nations; Mrs. Gibson on the temporary committee of the advisory school board committee.

Our two radio stations and television station have been most cooperative in giving us time for special events, especially our Candidates meeting, with interviews and spot announcements.

We have furnished panel members and material for PTA programs.

We have taken advantage, when the occasion presented itself, to use the "Letters to the Editor" column in the newspapers to make known our views on certain issues at all levels of government.

In our Candidates meeting, we believe we used every media of publicity possible from newspaper articles to printed napkins, dispersed at all civic dinners, luncheons, etc., also all service club groups...even to the "kids" bulletin board at one of the local supermarkets!

All in all, we are proud of our public relations in our community and will continue to maintain this same good-will for the coming year.

PUBLICATIONS:

STATE LEVEL

Constitutional Revision:

(a) Revenue From September 27 to October 25 five workshop meetings were held weekly in the Y.W.C.A. to study the present revenue structure and features in the state of Illinois and to consider the features of the Proposed Revenue Amendment. On November 16 at two unit meetings the highlights of the present Revenue Article of the Illinois constitution were presented to the membership along with a summary of the outstanding changes which would be effected if the proposed Revenue Amendment is approved by the voters.

(b) Judicial Reform So far this year Judicial Reform has not been an item for study in the League of Women Voters of Decatur. It is hoped that a field trip or court visit may be arranged later to offer interested persons an opportunity to consider the

various aspects of this particular subject.

NATIONAL LEVEL

<u>Freedom Agenda</u> - As most of you know by now, the Freedom Agenda project is an educational program designed to increase our understanding and appreciation of the role that individual freedom plays in our system of government. It also recognizes the need for national security.

After a number of workshop meetings early last year, we had three unit meetings in April using as a basis for discussions two of the Freedom Agenda booklets, "The Bill of Rights and Our Individual Liberties" and "Where Constitutional Liberty Came From." The meetings were very well attended and included representatives from eighteen other organizations in the city.

In May we participated in a series of television programs over WCIA sponsored by the Champaign County League. Mr. Charles Lippert, Mr. Jon Anderson and myself (Mrs.Clifford Smith) composed a panel representing Decatur. Our subject was "The Constitution and Congressional Investigating Committees." Preceding our appearance on the program was a short but excellent and dramatic skit in which local Little Theater actors played the parts of two senators and the president of the Senate in the period just before the Civil War during an investigation of John Brown's raid on Harper's Ferry.

During the summer, arrangements were started for two discussion groups to meet during October and early November. In September our newspapers gave excellent editorial notice of these meetings, but only the Y.W.C.A. group with Gertrude Hill as leader held them as scheduled. Freedom Agenda material was also used for some of the regular Y.W. groups with Mr. & Mrs. Nat Kessler as leaders.

In January Professor George Frampton of the University of Illinois, Law School spoke to us at a luncheon meeting on "Procedures in Loyalty-Security Determination".

This month a panel from the League will give a program for the Y.W.C.A. Public Affairs luncheon meeting. Mrs. C. M. Nicholson, Mrs. Neal Doubleday, Mrs. Nat Kessler and Mrs. John Donovan will appear there using the individual liberties theme.

A final means of using the Freedom Agenda material has been the giving of sets of the booklets to Decatur High School, the four Junior High Schools and to the office of the County Superintendent of Schools.

World Trade:

Last week, at the request of State, Katherine Donovan, Rachel Hurley and Pauline Winn were out taking pictures to show just how the interviews were conducted.

I have a request from State for some human interest stories as a result of our survey. If any of you interviewers can come up with some funny and/or interesting experiences, please send them to me or call me and I'll try to get them down on paper.

PROPOSED CHANGE IN LOCAL BY-LAWS

Article IX

Program

- Sec. 1. Authorization. The governmental principles adopted by the National Convention, and supported by the League as a whole, constitute the authorization for the adoption of program.
- Sec. 2. Local Program. The Program consists of the local governmental measures and policies on which the League of Women Voters of Decatur may take action. The Current Agenda and Continuing Responsibilities as hereinafter defined constitute the Program.
- Sec. 3. Current Agenda. The Current Agenda shall be limited to such local governmental issues as the membership shall choose for action in the following manner:
 - a) The Board of Directors shall consider the recommendations sent in by the voting members two months prior to the Annual Meeting and shall formulate a Proposed Current Agenda.
 - b) The Proposed Current Agenda shall be sent to all members one month before the Annual Meeting.
 - c) A majority vote of voting members present and voting at the Annual Meeting shall be required for adoption of subjects in the Proposed Current Agenda as presented to the Annual Meeting by the Board of Directors.
 - d) Recommendations for Current Agenda submitted by voting members two months prior to the Annual Meeting but not recommended by the Board of Directors may be considered by the Annual Meeting provided that: (1) the Annual Meeting shall order consideration by a two-thirds vote and (2) the Annual Meeting shall adopt the item by a two-thirds vote.
 - e) Changes in the Current Agenda, in the case of altered conditions, may be made provided that: (1) the information concerning the proposed changes has been sent to all members at least two weeks prior to a general membership meeting at which the change is to be discussed, and (2) final action by the membership is taken at a succeeding meeting.
- Sec. 4. Continuing Responsibilities. Continuing Responsibilities shall be those positions on local governmental issues to which the League of Women Voters of Decatur has given sustained attention, on which it may continue to act, as determined by the Annual Meeting.
 - a) The Continuing Responsibilities may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any Annual Meeting provided notice of the proposed changes shall have been sent by the Board of Directors to all members one month before the Annual Meeting.
 - b) The Annual Meeting may act upon any change proposed by a member if such change has been sent to the Board of Directors two months prior to the Annual meeting but has not been recommended by the Board of Directors, provided that: (1) the Annual Meeting shall order consideration by a two-thirds vote, and (2) the Annual Meeting shall adopt the item by a two-thirds vote.
 - c) Every six years the Board shall review the Continuing Responsibilities and submit to the members its recommendations for keeping the Continuing Responsibilities current, using the regular procedure for amendment outline in (a) and (b) of this section.
- Sec. 5. Member Action. Members may act in the name of the League of Women Voters only when authorized to do so by the proper Board of Directors. Marcia McCracken Chm

TO MEMBERS OF THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF DECATUR:

The Amarillo League of Women Voters of Amarillo, Texas, has prepared the following proposals which will be debatéd and accepted or rejected at the National Convention, April 30-May 4, 1956.

PROPOSAL #1: A local League shall comply with all requests for opinions from the League of Women Voters of the United States and the State League or explain its reason for not doing so. (To be added to paragraph on Program Factor, page 2, Local Leader's Handbook)

PROPOSAL #2: That the National Board establish a policy and practice of providing local Leagues with factual results of League opinion surveys when such information is requested.

PROPOSAL #3: Results of opinion surveys shall not be made available verbatim to officials, newspapers or the public, although general statements may be used to emphasize the strangth of League positions. (To be inserted immediately following the sentence beginning "Time for Action..." found at the top of page 12, Local Leader's Handbook. Insertion be italicized and mandatory.)

Background

These proposals arise out of dissatisfaction with the League of Women Voters of the United States' stand against the Bricker amendment. In August 1953, the National Board sent a request to all Local Leagues to study the proposed Bricker Amendment and submit a consensus of opinion regarding it. DECATUR HAS ALWAYS CONSIDERED SUCH REQUESTS TO BE MANDATORY. Accordingly workshops were arranged under the chairmanship of Mrs. Clifford Smith. Three meetings were held with the workshop members probing the pros and cons. A fourth meeting on Nov. 3rd was arranged with 2 lawyers, Mr. J. E. Jackson and Mr. Charles Lippert, one definitely pro and one definitely con. The accumulation of these four meetings was presented to the membership at 3 unit meetings on Nov. 18 and 19, 1953, pro and con. The results of membership opinion were sent to the National Board in January, 1954. At that time we were keeping no record of unit attendance, but I believe it is safe to estimate that out of a membership of 131 in 1953, Decatur's opinion was based upon approximately 35 members who were interested enough to either join the workshop or attend the unit meetings. This means approximately 26% of the membership decided and acted for all the membership.

Structure of the League

On all levels, local, state and national, the League has patterned itself after the manner of government in the United States. Our units resemble the town meeting in that material is discussed and when action is contemplated, agreement reached. It has been assumed that when proper notification is given the membership through the local bulletin, lack of majority attendance of members does not hamper the League from acting, and acting in the name of the total membership. Decisions are similarly reached in state and national conventions. Thusly, when your representatives in either the state General Assembly or the Federal Congress, study, discuss and vote upon a measure, they do not go back to their constituents and count heads to decide their vote. If they did, no issue would ever reach a final vote. These assemblies would become inoperative. So it is with the League, should we establish the practice of counting heads and each time insist upon 51% agreement before action, we would never act. BY VIRTUE OF YOUR VOLUNTARY MEMBERSHIP IN THE LEAGUE, YOU ARE COMMITTED AS A MEMBER TO LEAGUE DECISIONS, YOUR ABSENCES AND YOUR SILENCE NOTWITHSTANDING. So it is in government. Your absence from the polls does not prevent the election of government officials or prevent those officials from passing legislation in your name.

Proposals #1, 2, 3:

Your local Board believes that Proposal #1 will be seriously debated and may pass but that #2 and 3 will be voted down by the National Convention. Your local Board is opposed to all 3 proposals as worded.

(Proposal #1 is opposed on the basis that the word "opinions" alone does not clearly designate how the proposal will be interpreted. The implication by Amarillo is that they are against "consensus". If they designate counting heads with majority membership agreement mandatory, they are removing the League, locally, state and nationally, clear out of the action field and committing it to the status of study group only.) If "opinions" is designated to mean "consensus of those present" your local Board would not oppose an amendment to that effect.

Your local Board has agreed that should amendments be offered to Proposal #1, your delegate use her best judgment since the Board is not opposed to a request from National Board for study and consensus of

opinion of those present, becoming mandatory upon the local League.

V (Proposal #2 has two implications:

1. that local Leagues must submit opinions based upon agreement by 51% or more of the membership. This implication is clear because the very fact that such a proposal is submitted implies that national should not act unless it is acting for a majority of the membership.

2. Secondly, it implies a distrust of the National Board.

1. Leagues would become mere study groups or,

2. To ensure action in the name of a majority, membership would be slashed to 1/3 of the present 127,000 members. Your local Board bases this upon the feeling that we do not believe other Leagues are different from Decatur in the ratio of active members, or

3. Less drastically, it means separating locally the active members from the inactive members and permitting only the active members voting privileges....and when we act, we act in the name of active

members only.

Should Proposal #2 pass, proposal #3 would be a foregone conclusion and would not matter one way or another.

Conclusion

This matter merits your serious consideration. If you are in disagreement with your local Board or wish further explanation, please call me immediately.

Item 2: CONSERVATION: A study of Water Resources.

PROGRAM PLANNING CONFERENCE

The Program Planning Conference held on October 30 at the Congress Hotel in Chicago represented high level planning by the State Board. The entire program was designed to stimulate thinking in the various

fields of government, looking toward a timely program for the League to adopt at the convention next May. The first speaker on the program Tuesday was: Dr. Richard G. Browne, Executive Officer of the Illinois Teacher's College Board, who spoke on "What's Ahead for Illinois." He discussed the tasks of improving the structure and function of government at the state level, which he said is a problem always before us. The speaker for the luncheon meeting was Dr. Dexter Perkins, Professor of American Civilitation, Cornell University. His topic was "Popular Government and Foreign Policy." He discussed events since 1945 at the end of the war, pointing up the rivalry between the United States and Soviet Russia. He talked about NATO, the Warsaw Pact, Red China, The peace with Japan, the U.N. and the fast breaking Middle East problem which was uppermost in everyone's mind. There were question and answer periods at the conclusion of both talks. Mrs. Phillips' topic was "What's Ahead for the League." She reminded the group to consider in our thinking on program planning the League's list of continuing responsibilities, the fields we might be most helpful in at both the State and National levels. Each and every League member is invited to send in suggestions. They should be in to the State Office not later than January. It is to be hoped that we will all contribute to the suggestion file for program planning ---our next most important thing to consider after voting November 6th!
