Final Finance Drive Report: The proposed budget called for \$1020 to be collected. Final total was \$1055.50, exceeding the goal by \$35.50.

Statistics

Budgeted: from members, \$175; from non-members \$845.

NEWS NOTES: Decatur area industries will have an opportunity to confer on their stake in foreign trade. The economic development committee of the Association of Commerce has announced its decision to stage a foreign trade conference, possibly in May or June. The move was prompted by the fact that 26 local firms are now engaged in some sort of foreign trade and others may be considering it.

The first state-by-state breakdown on exports of manufactured goods has recently been issued by the Commerce Dept. Illinois is second only to New York in the tally which shows the figures for 1960: New York: \$1,417,400,000; Illinois: \$1,407,800,000. California, Ohio and Pennsylvania followed closely in that order. The total for the country as a whole: \$15,454,300,000. This was the first analysis of its kind and will be followed by detailed reports on the impact of international trade on economic conditions in more than 140 congressional districts. EMERGENCY BUS STUDY A special meeting concerning the bus study, called on October 24th, included a brief history of public transportation in the United States, a resume of city manager John Dever's "Report on Problems of Mass Transportation", attending a few School Board meetings, the highlights of the legislature on transportation, plus a summary of the interviews with officials of the City Lines.

The committee found obstacles impossible to solve in a short time. The overwhelming task of determining how the overlapping school routes might co-ordinate with the restricted city routes came to a dead end. The request from the Transportation Committee of the Association of Commerce for a comparison of findings was a complement to the League efforts. (One enlightening factor - a man's viewpoint on the issue versus a woman's point of view.)

PRO: The .05 per gallon reduction on fuel tax to Bus companies. Legislative permission to form a regulatory "transportation district". Federal loans to allow the study of the problem within state districts.

CON: Legislative failure to pass the bill which would have allowed cities to by-pass the Illinois Commerce Commission and deal directly with bus companies. The abortive struggle to merge school bus routes and city bus routes.

Outlying districts were given this suggestion: try chartered, scheduled routes to prove needs of bus services. The City Lines admitted they were doing somewhat better, and would only pull out entirely if their losses increased drastically.

FORE IGN POLICY

The Foreign Policy committee of ten members began a series of five workshop meetings in October and reported at the November Unit meetings. Chief among the materials used was the national publication "The Politics of Trade". The study and unit discussions led to the following conclusions: 1) our members favor continuance of support to the present basic trade aid position --that is, support of foreign economic policies which serve to spur econ-

omic growth and to expand world trade; 2) we would favor federal assistance in the form of tax adjustments to encourage modernization of industry; 3) federal co-operation with industry and labor unions to retrain the unemployed; 4) we think some special trade concessions for the newly-developed countries may be necessary; 5) we recognize the necessity for close ties with the European Common Market; 6) we feel that the countries of the Free World must trade with Japan. The Irade consensus report sent to the National and State offices included a minority opinion on the question of economic aid.

Community work toward publicizing the importance of world trade co-operation and expansion is carried out as the opportunity arises. At present, 20 copies of "The Politics of Trade" are being distributed to persons and organizations that will use them to the greatest advantage.

Judicial Amendment: The League will actively enlist support for the Judicial Amendment to be voted on in the fall elections. Fortunately, there are other groups, such as the Illinois Bar Association, the Committee for Modern Courts, etc., who will be working, too. But League members must become informed before we can be effective. Shirley ndholt, our Judicial Chairman, will start workshops on the Amendment toward the end of april, to report to the May units. Call Shirley, 423-0410, and tell her you want to be a member of the Workshop. She suggests you call by 8:00 in the morning to be sure of reaching her.

CALLS FOR ACTION We have had two Calls for Action, one for the U.N. Bond Issue, and one for the Trade Expansion Act.

- U.N. Betty Bachrach, our new president, sent telegrams to Senators Dirksen and Douglas; you have surely seen that the Senate voted overwhelmingly to give the President authority to either lend the money or buy the bonds. Now the measure goes to the House. From our interview with Congressman Springer, I think we can persuade him to go along with this action. There is a good discussion of the U.N. Bond Issue in the National Voter for March, 1962. Read it and write Mr. Springer.
- The Trade Expansion Act of 1962 (H.R. 9900) Since Congressman Springer is not on the Ways and Means Committee, which has been conducting hearings on the Bill, we are to start our campaign in the middle of April, when the Bill goes to the floor. Since Mr. Springer is on the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, and in his interview with us indicated considerable support for the Bill, I think he will receive your letters sympathetically.

In May, we begin writing our Senators, expressing hope for a strong trade bill. Especially we write to Senator Douglas who is on the Senate Finance Committee.

By June, the Bill should have reached the Senate floor, when we go all out.

Before writing, read the National Voter for March, p.2, and the Illinois Voter, for March, April. You might go back also to the National Voter for November-December, 1961: "Yes, No or Maybe So". In her statement before the House Ways and Means Committee, Mrs. John Briscoe, first Vice-president of the LWV of U.S., made these points: that a liberal trade policy would:

1. pave the way for political harmony with other nations

2. stimulate economic growth at home and abroad

3. expand opportunities for consumer choice among a wide variety of products.

The article in the National Voter of March, 1962 is a pretty close summary of her statement, so be sure to read it, and start your writing in a week or so.

Although the attendance was not so large as last year's, the discussion was Annual Meeting lively. The budget was adopted as it appears in the February Bulletin, though there was a feeling that we might contribute more in the future toward State and National support.

The agenda included the two recommended items given in the February Bulletin:

1. A study of the benefits to Decatur under the Council-Manager plan of city government,

compared with those under the Commission form.

2. A further study of the Urban Renewal program, as it enters another phase of its development. Under this last item, there were suggestions that we might consider a number of projects, such as the placing of new through-ways, the building of a Community Center, etc.

After the above items were proposed, a number of members suggested other items. After a good deal of discussion, a third item was adopted:

3. A study of the operation of School District #61, and of the necessity for a referendum covering school expansion -- with action where indicated.

It was thought that there was a good deal of confusion about the proposed school referendum, and the League might render a real public service in making an independent study.

The Continuing Responsibilities were slightly changed since some items previously on the CR list were now made active items, and the Health Study became a CR. These now stand:

1. Support of measures designed to improve the structure and/or increase the efficiency and economical operation of governments in Macon County.

Support of a sewer system which will provide all citizens of the Decatur area with adequate sanitary facilities.

Support of sound development of Decatur's water resources.

Support for the establishment and efficient operation of a county-wide Health Dep't.

Judicial Amendment: The League will actively enlist support for the Judicial Amendment to be voted on in the fall elections. Fortunately, there are other groups, such as the Illinois Bar Association, the Committee for Modern Courts, etc., who will be working, too. But League members must become informed before we can be effective. Shirley Landholt, our Judicial Chairman, will start workshops on the Amendment toward the end of April, to report to the May units. Call Shirley, 423-0410, and tell her you want to be a member of the Workshop. She suggests you call by 8:00 in the morning to be sure of reaching her.

CALLS FOR ACTION We have had two Calls for Action, one for the U.N. Bond Issue, and one for the Trade Expansion Act.

- 1. U.N. Betty Bachrach, our new president, sent telegrams to Senators Dirksen and Douglas; you have surely seen that the Senate voted overwhelmingly to give the President authority to either lend the money or buy the bonds. Now the measure goes to the House. From our interview with Congressman Springer, I think we can persuade him to go along with this action. There is a good discussion of the U.N. Bond Issue in the National Voter for March, 1962. Read it and write Mr. Springer.
- 2. The Trade Expansion Act of 1962 (H.R. 9900) Since Congressman Springer is not on the Ways and Means Committee, which has been conducting hearings on the Bill, we are to start our campaign in the middle of April, when the Bill goes to the floor. Since Mr. Springer is on the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, and in his interview with us indicated considerable support for the Bill, I think he will receive your letters sympathetically.

In May, we begin writing our Senators, expressing hope for a strong trade bill. Especially we write to Senator Douglas who is on the Senate Finance Committee.

By June, the Bill should have reached the Senate floor, when we go all out.

Before writing, read the National Voter for March, p.2, and the Illinois Voter, for March, April. You might go back also to the National Voter for November-December, 1961: "Yes, No or Maybe So". In her statement before the House Ways and Means Committee, Mrs. John Briscoe, first Vice-president of the LWV of U.S., made these points: that a liberal trade policy would:

- 1. pave the way for political harmony with other nations
- 2. stimulate economic growth at home and abroad
- 3. expand opportunities for consumer choice among a wide variety of products.

The article in the National Voter of March, 1962 is a pretty close summary of her statement, so be sure to read it, and start your writing in a week or so.

Annual Meeting Although the attendance was not so large as last year's, the discussion was lively. The budget was adopted as it appears in the February Bulletin, though there was a feeling that we might contribute more in the future toward State and National support.

The agenda included the two recommended items given in the February Bulletin:

- 1. A study of the benefits to Decatur under the Council-Manager plan of city government, compared with those under the Commission form.
- 2. A further study of the Urban Renewal program, as it enters another phase of its development. Under this last item, there were suggestions that we might consider a number of projects, such as the placing of new through-ways, the building of a Community Center, etc.

After the above items were proposed, a number of members suggested other items. After a good deal of discussion, a third item was adopted:

3. A study of the operation of School District #61, and of the necessity for a referendum covering school expansion -- with action where indicated.

It was thought that there was a good deal of confusion about the proposed school referendum, and the League might render a real public service in making an independent study.

The Continuing Responsibilities were slightly changed since some items previously on the CR list were now made active items, and the Health Study became a CR. These now stand:

- 1. Support of measures designed to improve the structure and/or increase the efficiency and economical operation of governments in Macon County.
- 2. Support of a sewer system which will provide all citizens of the Decatur area with adequate sanitary facilities.
- 3. Support of sound development of Decatur's water resources.
- 4. Support for the establishment and efficient operation of a county-wide Health Dep't.
