Legislative Schools: During each session of the Illinois General Assembly the League sponsors, for its members at the state capital, Legislative Schools. The school familiarizes members with workings of the General Assembly and makes our State Government come alive. We are allowed 4 delegates (more if another League doesn't use its quota). We attend sessions of House and Senate, committee hearings and get in on-the-scene briefing on legislation of League interest. There is also time for questioning and discussion with our own State Legislative Chairman.

LOCAL AGENDA

After our first meeting, the members of the Committee agreed to discuss with Board members and other league members any suggestions

we might receive. The only suggestion we have had in the meantime is that we limit the local agenda to one item and that it must therefore be the Urban Renewal item, inasmuch as the League is still working on it. We have, however, changed the wording somewhat in order to broaden the possible scope of study, as follows:

Urban Renewal and Area Planning: Study of urban renewal and area planning and analysis of Decatur's need for an effective urban renewal program, with action where indicated.

We have added to Local Continuing Responsibilities the other two 1958 local agenda items, and the list is now as follows:

## Local Continuing Responsibilities:

- Continued support of school financial and organizational needs where such support is deemed in the best interests of the community.
- That the Council Manager form of government is preferable to the commission form of government.
- That we will continue to support a sewer system which provides all citizens of the Decatur Sanitary District with adequate sanitary facilities.
- Township and Council Manager study and analysis of governments within Macon County with action where indicated.
- Decatur's water resources, with special reference to the proposed Big Creek Development, and allowing action if consensus is reached.

We suggest that Items 2 and 4 be combined as follows:

"That the Council Manager form of government is preferable to the commission form of government and that we will support the Council Manager form of government; that we will continue our interest in Township governments within Macon County."

The Committee feels a responsibility to include in this report the fact that we considered putting a school item on the agenda, in view of possible changes coming up affecting School District 61. We did not do this because we feel that the work-load involved in the Urban Renewal item is so big that nothing else should be considered. We feel that the community may expect the League to work on any school problem arising, and we want to point out that it will be impossible without further study, which we cannot do this year unless a school item is on the local agenda. We simply want to create an awareness of the situation as we think it exists at this time.

## ANNUAL REPORTS:

### Water Workshop, Local Item:

The study group for this item sponsored two go-see trips to the Big Creek and Oakley areas, on July 1 and Oct. 22, with Mr. Beeson, city conservationist, as guide. Twenty members went on the trip, and were rewarded by a better understanding of their community and of conservation, as well as specific information for our project.

Workshops, with ten members participating, were held on Nov. 5, Dec. 3 and Jan. 7. Also, a meeting with 20 league members present was held on Nov. 13 with Dr. Greenfield, water engineer at Staley's and chairman of the Council's water advisory committee, giving a lecture on the water needs of Decatur and Big Creek in particular.

Findings of the workshop were presented in a leaflet entitled "Decatur's Water Resources", which was mailed to contributors and members. At the January unit meetings, open discussion by all the members resulted in concensus to support the Big Creek bond issue.

Although the Big Creek proposal lost two to one at the polls, we gained through furthering new understanding of Decatur Water Supply, supporting a measure which needed citizen support and getting acquainted with some fine professional people.

### Township Study and Action

For one, one-half years a League Committee of ten members studied Decatur Township Government as it is and as it was proposed to be under the city township. Our conclusions were published May 1, 1958 in a nine page report. We refused to join the Association of Commerce and the Decatur Newspapers on a pro city township stand for these reasons.

- 1. So many conflicting laws have been passed by the General Assembly pertaining to city townships that it is impossible, before the change is made, to determine either the physical or fiscal structure of that government.
- 2. The League could find no single over-riding benefit to the community in general from the change: for every injustice the change would correct, it would create new injustices in other geographical areas.

3. We believe it is extremely poor governmental policy to ask for a "blind" vote on any issue. The voter has the right to have facts available that will provide him a base for determining preference.

This month from the Washington, D. C. office comes word of two ladies from the Argentine, Senoras Berzero and Miri, who have just completed a two months trip in the U.S.A., sponsored by the CCCMF, leaving Washington on September 30, visiting New Jersey, Connecticut, Ohio, Indiana, Minnesota, Iowa and New York. These visitors studied citizenship education intensively, observing methods used by the League of Women Voters.

At Home and Abroad The fact that experience gained in one part of the world can be adapted for use in many others continues to be strikingly demonstrated.

A CCCMF consultant from Michigan, Mrs. Leonard Rall, conducted a workshop in Brazil, where her husband was a member of a U. S. Mission. She was able to share with over 30 Brazilians results of her local LWV experience--- As a result of this, we have received statements like this: "Your course was a great benefit to me"; "I think with your help and the Power of God I shall be useful to society and to my country."

And from within the U. S. A., we continue to get reports from communities which have shared in the visitors' exchange programs. Results show a deepened understanding, respect and sympathy for the problems of other nations and doubled intensity of interest in our own. Over and over again it works both ways!

Trends Do you know that of the many uses of water, four will be of special concern in the future?: irrigation, industrial supply, recreational water use, and waste carrying? Many people do not realize that waste disposal is an important function of water. Of course, if carried to excess this function results in pollution, since pollution is waste-disposal which disregards the other uses of water.

Do you know that supplemental irrigation is coming to the eastern part of the country, where formerly it was just a curiosity? Irrigation is a very heavy water user. Its expansion in the regions where the largest cities and the heaviest industrial use will continue to be located must inevitably create competition for both local and regional supplies.

Do you know we are in a period of water development comparable to the building of the rail-roads in the period from 1860-1900? We are just over the threshold of a period in which a similar kind of construction activity is taking place. At the end of the next twenty to thirty years one will be able to look at a map of the United States and see two or three or four reservoirs for every one shown on our present map, and the works for the regulation of water will have been "frozen" into the landscape.

Do you know that a recent study dealing with "Relative Costs and Benefits of Land Reclamation in the Humid Southeast and Semi-Arid West", showed that production cost of similar crops in a specific location in the East; and another under irrigation in the West, indicated much lower costs in the East? If this is so and widely recognized, we may find substantial federal investment supporting additional agricultural water demands in the East where the return for the Federal dollar might be greater than in the West. The growth of the upstream water development programs (dams, etc.) by the Soil Conservation Service under the amended Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act of 1956 will result in impoundment of flood waters to help meet this demand. The cost of these developments will fall largely on the federal taxpayer, and will be tremendous.

For the League of Women Voters, consensus means an agreement among a substantial number of a representative group of members (not just a simple majority) reached after sustained study and group discussion.

Why do we have it? Consensus is a prerequisite to the League's taking any position on national, state, or local government issues. Consensus also determines what action, if any, is to be taken on the item under consideration.

Why does your opinion count? It is essential that when a League position is announced, the members are informed and in basic agreement. This is true for positions taken by our local League; local Leagues in the State determine State League position; in turn, State Leagues determine National League position. What could be more democratic?

In the October units we are taking consensus on the water resources item. In the November units we are taking consensus on the foreign policy item. Your opinion counts a great deal.

VOTERS SERVICE

Question and answer sheets from the Board of Education were given out at our Sept. luncheon and Oct. unit meetings. These contained figures on assessed value per child, tax rates in Macon County for schools - and for schools similar in size to Decatur's - along with other factual information.

Highlights:

1. In 1963, four years from now, there will be 3,355 more children in Decatur schools than there are this year, an average of over 800 more each year than the year before.

2. This year, teachers' salaries were not increased, and because other school systems increased theirs, Decatur lost much of its competitive position when hiring teachers.

3. There will be two ballots. One concerning issuing bonds for new buildings and additions amounting to \$6,296,000 which, when all bonds would be out, would increase taxes  $17\phi$  per \$100 assessed value. One concerning an increase in education fund tax rate limit from \$1.80 to \$2.20 to provide teachers, equipment, and supplies (salaries account for 80%).

Our local continuing responsibility item reads, "Support of measures designed to improve the structure and/ or to increase the efficiency and economical operation of School District #61, and of governments in Macon County".

The League does not take a stand on an issue unless it has been studied on the local agenda within the last six months, and a consensus reached.

Tags reminding voters to exercise their voting privilege were distributed through the schools, Vote, November 10.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

- 2. Present Illinois Constitution What is in the bill of rights? Are there any new rights that need to be added?
- 3. Problems Those that can only be done by constitutional revisions or can be done by legislation.
- 4. Convention How Why Is it superior to a piece-meal amending process?

Mr. John Bebout, a member of the Constitutional Revision Commission of the National Municipal League will speak on November 18.

This is just a sampling of the questions posed. Would you like to begin to be a part of this study? It affects everyone in problems of school finance, taxation, labor relations, social welfare, State aid, etc. It is to be a long range study.
