FOREIGN POLICY

We concentrated on a study of the existing programs in which the U.S. participates in order to expand world economic development. Then we asked ourselves, "What are the characteristics of an adequate program?" The conclusions reached may be listed as follows - the programs should (1) be long range (2) be large enough to avoid "a mere nibbling at the fringe of problems" (3) be multilateral enough to give the program objectivity and to share costs and responsibility (4) be well co-ordinated to provide consistant policy direction (5) be well administered so as to assure the economical use of funds and the employment of qualified and dedicated personnel.
