SUGGESTED NATIONAL CURRENT AGENDA ITEMS

1. Action on legislation affecting the five Federal Security programs in the following areas: a) Need for the programs; b) Scope

of the programs; c) Coordination, Standardization; d) Standards & Criteria; e) Procedures. Explanation: Decatur definitely does not want this area dropped. It is dependent, however, on whether or not the LWV of US has reached concensus in any or all areas pertaining to the programs.

II. Evaluation of a water resource policy which will develop river basins as a unit with coordinated planning and improved administration.

Explanation: We believe this study can be narrowed to make it easier to handle. We have phrased it to allow for further study but not to hamper action in any areas in which we manage to reach consensus. The importance of this item is self-evident. The most beneficial development of our water resources is basic to our continued economic development which in turn is basic to all our governmental endeavors in any other area, domestic or international.

III. An evaluation of the federal-state-local distribution of policy powers and administrative duties to determine their proper relationship to each other.

Explanation: We consider this most timely and vital. The acquisition of federal power, whatever the reason, is a much less painful operation than the relinquishing of it. As solutions to problems are farther removed from the citizen, it tends to relieve him of the need to think politically, to participate politically, eventually lack of knowledge and the magnitude of the accumulated problems leads him to seek a "strong man" to lead the country.

Desire for a national economy item ran a very close fourth; however, in view of the membership's expressed desire for only two study items on the national agenda, it was not included.

NATIONAL LWV EDUCATION FUND

We are anxious to provide you with more information regarding the League of Women Voters Education Fund than it is possible to include in the VOTER. Since it takes considerable time for such funds both to obtain tax exemption and to get into full operation, the 1956 Council agreed it would be desirable to make a start as soon as possible.

The Fund is now set up through the generosity of 11 Founders who have contributed sufficient funds for a year's trial. No application for tax exemption has yet been made to the Internal Revenue Service nor will be till the end of the trial year so that time is allowed for the whole matter to be discussed and agreed upon by Convention before further steps are taken. There is a clause in the Fund Trust Agreement which permits its termination by vote of the League of Women Voters National Board.

The project selected for the trial period is not the one suggested to the Council but has been changed to something much simpler which our lawyers advise should meet the rigid requirements for tax exemption and which should be easy to accomplish on a minimum budget.

During the experimental period the Carrie Chapman Catt Memorial Fund will continue to operate as usual though confining itself principally to the international field. A written agreement as to policies for clearance to avoid any duplication between the two funds has been agreed upon.

Office space for the Education Fund has been rented in the new quarters of the Washington Office of the CCCMF on the fifth floor of 1026 - 17th Street, N. W., and Miss M. A. Conley has been engaged as Executive Director of the Education Fund.

REMARKS: The local agenda committee has based its choice of agenda items on these ideas:

- 1. The first item is essential in carrying out work that has already been started.
- 2. Item two is of wide scope and interest and is an important move toward general progress. The following suggested items were not chosen, reasons stated below:-

1. Study of mosquito control.

- 2. Evaluation of Child Safety in the Decatur School System.
- 3. Need for sidewalks in certain areas for school children.

4. Study of the possibility of a junior college for Decatur.

- 1. Committee felt that the suggested items above did not have a broad enough scope to make them the best choice for our local agenda.
- 2. In the case of mosquito control, the time element involved would not make it possible for our League to accomplish anything in time for this year.

3. The area of sidewalks could certainly come as a part of a study on Urban Renewal, fitting

into a broader catagory.

4. Our committee felt that the suggestion for an item on school safety was a good one. However, since the PTA is working on this right now, the feeling was that that organization is in a better position to make progress in this field.

Irene Colvis, Membership Chairman NATIONAL NEWS RELEASE In announcing the position, which reflects concensus of the League membership, Mrs. John G. Lee, national President said: "In the interest of strengthening national security and maintaining our traditional concepts of freedom, the League of Women Voters of the United States believes that the federal loyalty-security program should be modified so as to: "1) limit the coverage of sensitive positions and provide for more realistic classification of information;

"2) institute more uniform procedures in the administration of the programs;

"3) apply a common sense standard in judging the individual; and

"4) develop procedures which will provide the greatest possible protection for the individual."

She also said the League is now ready to support or oppose action by either the executive or the legislative branch of the federal government, in line with the League position.

Mrs. Lee continued:

"The position which the League of Women Voters has reached comes as the result of four years of study by our members in the field of individual liberties as related to the public interest. The latter half of this study has been concentrated upon the evaluation of the federal loyalty-security programs, with recognition of the need for safeguarding national security and protecting individual liberties.

"Over 1,000 local Leagues took part in the examination of the federal loyalty-security programs, the conditions they were intended to meet and their operation. Members considered varying points of view in regard to present need and changes suggested. Reading and discussion were supplemented by the use of outside experts, including individuals actually carrying out the programs as well as a variety of authorities in the field.

"In the spring of 1957, at the request of the Commission on Government Security, the League submitted to it an interim report which showed emerging areas of agreement. By December, an overwhelming majority of local Leagues reported that their study and discussion had brought them to a point where they were able to report the conclusions of their members. The position announced today by the national Board reflects these conclusions."

Under the chairmanship of Helen Leigh, the League distributed copies of "Little Drops of Water" to non-member contributors and will distribute this month copies of the Jan.-Feb. issue of the Illinois voter which is devoted to "Significant Roll Calls"......Distribution also of the analysis of Real Estate Assessments in Decatur will be made this month to members of Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions, Optimists, Realtors, Business & Professional Women and Jaycees. We hope to have a display of League information pertinent to the present Congressional discussion on Reciprocal Trade in front of the Decatur Public Library. Enclosed are two studies: one made by the League of Women Voters on property within the City of Decatur; the second a copy of the study made by a committee composed of Mr. L. W. Hurtt, Chairman, Mr. Russell Hirsch and Dr. D. M. Shields, appointed by the County Board of Supervisors.

Although both studies are comparatives of assessed value to actual selling price, the League believes that together they give a true picture of existing conditions regarding the assessment of property for tax purposes in this area.

Since 1958 is a quadrennial assessment year and according to law all property in Illinois is open to re-appraisal for tax purposes, the League would like to know if you have any plans underway for Decatur Township that will tend to bring the property at both extremes of high and low percentages into more equitable balance with those properties ranging between 40 to 60 percent of assessed value to actual selling price.

Do you know that water must be recognized as the limiting factor in the development of the West? The 17 Western states embracing 60 percent of the land area of the nation receive too little rainfall to ensure general agriculture.

Do you know that the President's Materials Policy Commission estimated a near trebling of industrial water use in 1975 as compared to 1950? Along with irrigation, industrial water demands will be tremendous. With the population growing at an explosive rate, working hours diminishing and natural water sites becoming occupied, the need for positive recreational planning in water development will be imperative.
